SUBSTITUTION



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Dance: To move rhythmically to music, often as a form of expression or celebration.

Example: "They danced all night at the wedding reception."

Dark: Lacking or having very little light; the absence of light.

Data: Information, facts, or figures that can be processed or analyzed.

Example: "The data collected will help us make informed decisions."

Dazzle: To impress or blind temporarily with intense light or brilliance.

Example: "The fireworks display dazzled the crowd."

Daughter: A female child or offspring of parents.

Example: "His daughter is studying medicine in college."

Danger: The state of being exposed to harm, risk, or the possibility of an adverse event.

Example: "Entering the restricted area is a danger to your safety."

Daisy: A type of flowering plant with white petals and a yellow center.

Example: "She picked a daisy from the garden."

Dairy: Relating to or involving milk and milk products.

Example: "The dairy aisle in the supermarket has a variety of cheeses."

Dare: To have the courage to do something challenging or risky; a challenge.

Example: "She dared to climb the highest mountain."

Damp: Slightly wet or moist; often referring to the feeling of humidity.

Example: "The clothes felt damp after being left out in the rain."

Dash: To run or move quickly; a short, quick sprint.

Example: "He made a dash for the finish line."

Dazzling: Extremely bright, impressive, or striking in appearance.

Example: "The night sky was filled with dazzling stars."

Database: A structured collection of data stored electronically for easy retrieval and manipulation.

Example: "They maintain a database of customer information."

Daffodil: A type of spring-flowering bulbous plant with yellow or white flowers.

Example: "The daffodils in the garden bloomed beautifully in the spring."

Daylight: The natural light of day; the period of time when it is light outside.

Example: "They preferred to hike in the daylight."

Dalmatian: A breed of dog known for its distinctive black or liver-colored spots.

Example: "The Dalmatian puppies were playful and energetic."

Dashboard: The control panel or instrument panel in a vehicle, often displaying information and controls related to the vehicle's performance.

Example: "The dashboard of the car showed the current speed, fuel level, and engine temperature."

Database: A structured collection of data stored electronically for easy retrieval and manipulation.

Example: "The database contains information about all the products in the inventory."

DC: An abbreviation for "Direct Current," which is a type of electric current that flows consistently in one direction.

Example: "Many electronic devices, such as batteries, use DC power."

Decision: A choice or conclusion reached after consideration; the act of making up one's mind.

Example: "She made the decision to pursue a career in medicine."

Delight: A high degree of pleasure, enjoyment, or happiness; to please greatly.

Example: "The children were in delight when they saw the presents."

Determine: To ascertain or establish something through investigation or analysis.

Example: "Scientists work to determine the cause of the disease."

Detect: To discover or find something, often through careful examination or investigation.

Example: "The detective was able to detect the hidden clue."

Defend: To protect or support against attack or criticism; to argue in favor of.

Example: "He defended his friend when others criticized him."

Demand: A request or requirement for something to be given, provided, or done; to ask for something forcefully.

Example: "There was a high demand for the new product."

Design: The plan or arrangement of elements in a visual or functional way; to create a plan or concept.

Example: "The architect presented the design for the new building."

Describe: To provide an account or representation in words; to explain the characteristics of something.

Example: "She described the breathtaking view from the mountaintop."

Detail: A small part or item; to describe or explain thoroughly.

Example: "The report includes every detail of the project."

Develop: To grow or advance in various ways; to create or improve something over time.

Example: "The company aims to develop new technologies."

Destroy: To cause severe damage or harm to something, often rendering it unusable.

Example: "The fire can destroy a forest in a matter of hours."

Detective: A person, often a police officer, who investigates and solves crimes.

Example: "The detective solved the mystery of the stolen jewelry."

Desire: A strong feeling of wanting or wishing for something; to have a longing or craving.

Example: "Her desire for adventure led her to travel the world."

Decide: To make a choice or reach a conclusion after consideration.

Example: "They needed to decide on a date for the wedding."

Declaration: A formal or explicit statement, often made publicly or officially.

Example: "The president made a declaration of peace during the ceremony."

Delivery: The act of bringing something to a person or place; the manner in which something is presented or performed.

Example: "The delivery of the package was delayed due to bad weather."

Depend: To rely on or be influenced by something or someone; to be contingent on.

Example: "The success of the project will depend on teamwork."

Destroy: To cause severe damage or harm to something, often rendering it unusable.

Dharma: In Hinduism and Buddhism, the moral and ethical duties and responsibilities that an individual must follow to live a righteous and virtuous life.

Example: "One's dharma may include honesty, compassion, and non-violence."

Dharmic: Relating to or in accordance with dharma; morally or ethically righteous.

Example: "Many people strive to lead a dharmic life based on their beliefs."

Dhobi: A person who works as a laundryman or washerman, often washing and ironing clothes for others.

Example: "The dhobi collected the clothes for washing and returned them neatly pressed."

Dhaka: The capital city of Bangladesh, known for its rich history and cultural heritage.

Example: "Dhaka is one of the most populous cities in the world."

Different: Not the same as something or someone else; distinct or diverse.

Example: "Each person has a different perspective."

Diligent: Showing care and conscientious effort in one's work or duties; hardworking.

Example: "She is a diligent student who always completes her assignments on time."

Direction: The course or path along which something moves or points; guidance or instruction.

Example: "Follow the direction of the sign to reach the museum."

Discovery: The act of finding or learning something new or previously unknown.

Example: "The scientist's discovery led to a breakthrough in medicine."

Dictionary: A reference book that provides definitions, meanings, and explanations of words and terms.

Example: "You can look up the word's definition in the dictionary."

Digital: Relating to or using technology that stores and processes data in numerical form, often using binary code.

Example: "Many devices, such as smartphones, are digital."

Diameter: The distance across a circle or a sphere, passing through its center.

Example: "The diameter of the Earth is approximately 12,742 kilometers."

Dinosaur: A prehistoric reptile that lived millions of years ago; often used to refer to extinct creatures of this type.

Example: "The museum has a collection of dinosaur fossils."

Difficulty: The state of being hard to accomplish or understand; a challenge.

Example: "He encountered some difficulty in solving the math problem."

Dialogue: A conversation or discussion between two or more people; communication.

Example: "The dialogue between the characters in the book was engaging."

Diplomacy: The skill and practice of managing international relations, often through negotiation and compromise.

Example: "Diplomacy can help prevent conflicts between nations."

Direct: To guide or aim something in a specific way; straightforward and without detours.

Example: "He will direct the team's efforts toward the project's goals."

Discipline: Control and training to improve behavior or skills; a field of study or knowledge.

Example: "The school emphasizes discipline in both academics and behavior."

Disagree: To have a differing opinion or belief; to not be in accord.

Example: "They may disagree on the best approach to the problem."

Disappear: To cease to be visible or exist; to go out of sight.

Example: "The magician made the rabbit disappear."

Disaster: A sudden and widespread event causing great damage or destruction; a catastrophe.

Example: "The earthquake was a natural disaster that affected many lives."

Distract: To divert one's attention or focus from something; to cause a loss of concentration.

Example: "The loud noise outside the window distracted the students."

Divide: To separate or split into parts or groups; to distribute or share.

Example: "They will divide the tasks evenly among the team members."

Doctor: A medical professional who diagnoses and treats illnesses and injuries; a title for those with a medical degree.

Example: "She visited the doctor for a check-up."

Diagram: A visual representation or chart that illustrates a concept or structure.

Example: "The diagram helped explain the process step by step."

Dull: Lacking brightness or sharpness; not interesting or exciting; slow to understand.

Example: "The lecture was so dull that many students struggled to stay awake."

Dm: An abbreviation for "decimeter," a unit of length in the metric system equal to one-tenth ($1/10$) of a meter.

Example: "The length of the room is 5.4 dm."

Doctor: A medical professional who diagnoses and treats illnesses and injuries; a title for those with a medical degree.

Example: "She visited the doctor for a check-up."

Document: A written, printed, or electronic record that provides information or evidence.

Example: "Please make sure to keep all important documents in a safe place."

Dolphin: A marine mammal known for its intelligence and playful behavior, often found in oceans and seas.

Example: "We were lucky to spot dolphins while on our boat trip."

Dominate: To have control or authority over something or someone; to be the most prominent or powerful.

Example: "The team's star player can dominate the game."

Donation: The act of giving something, typically money or goods, to a charitable cause or organization.

Example: "Their generous donation helped fund the construction of a new school."

Door: A movable barrier that opens and closes to provide access to a room, building, or vehicle.

Example: "Please knock on the door before entering."

Double: Twice the amount or size of something; to multiply by two.

Doubt: A feeling of uncertainty or lack of conviction about something; to question or be skeptical.

Down: In a lower position or direction; toward the ground or a lower level.

Dove: A bird known for its gentle and peaceful nature; often used as a symbol of peace.

Downtown: The central or main part of a city, typically characterized by commercial and business activities.

Driver: A person who operates a vehicle; a device or software that controls a hardware component.

Drum: A percussion instrument typically consisting of a cylindrical body and a membrane that is struck to produce sound.

Drunk: Under the influence of alcohol; intoxicated.

Drier: Something that removes moisture or wetness; a device used to dry clothes.

Dragon: Mythical or legendary creature often depicted as a large, fire-breathing reptile.

Example: "The knight faced a fierce dragon in the epic tale."

Duck: A waterfowl with a broad flat beak, webbed feet, and a quack sound; to lower the head or body quickly to avoid something.

Example: "The ducklings followed their mother to the pond."

Due: Expected or owed as a payment or obligation; the right time for something to happen.

Example: "The rent is due on the first day of each month."

Durable: Capable of withstanding wear, pressure, or damage; long-lasting.

Example: "The durable materials used in construction ensure the building's stability."

Dust: Fine particles of earth or other matter in the form of tiny dry particles that can be easily dispersed.

Example: "She wiped the dust off the bookshelf."

Dubious: Hesitating or doubting; questionable or uncertain in nature.

Example: "There is a dubious claim that aliens visited Earth."

Dull: Lacking brightness or sharpness; not interesting or exciting; slow to understand.

Example: "The lecture was so dull that many students struggled to stay awake."

Duty: A moral or legal obligation; a task or responsibility.

Duplicate: An identical copy or reproduction; to make a copy of something.

Dusk: The time of day immediately following sunset when the sky is partially dark but not fully dark.

Duty: A moral or legal obligation; a task or responsibility.

Dwell: To live in a particular place; to think, speak, or write at length about something.

Example: "They dwell in a small cottage by the lake."

Dynamo: A machine that generates electricity, often through the rotation of a coil within a magnetic field.

Example: "The dynamo powers the lights in the bicycle."

Duet: A musical composition for two performers or voices.

Example: "The singers performed a beautiful duet at the concert."

Dwindle: To become gradually less or smaller; to diminish in number or intensity.

Example: "The water level in the reservoir began to dwindle during the dry season."

Dungeon: A dark, often underground, room or cell used for imprisonment or storage.

Example: "The medieval castle had a dungeon for prisoners."

Dullard: A person who is slow to learn, mentally slow, or lacks intelligence.

Dusky: Somewhat dark in color; dim or shadowy.

Dual: Involving two elements or parts; double or twofold.

Example: "The smartphone has a dual camera setup for better photography."

Dumb: Lacking the ability to speak or temporarily unable to speak; lacking intelligence or good judgment.

Example: "He remained dumbfounded by the unexpected news."

Dugout: A shelter or trench, often used in military contexts or for protection against weather.

Example: "During the storm, they took refuge in the dugout."

Dwell: To live in a particular place; to think, speak, or write at length about something.

Example: "They dwell in a small cottage by the lake."

Dwindle: To become gradually less or smaller; to diminish in number or intensity.

Example: "The water level in the reservoir began to dwindle during the dry season."

Dwelling: A place where someone lives, such as a house, apartment, or other place of residence.

Dweller: A person who lives in a particular place or residence.

Dwight: A masculine given name.

Dwell on: To think or talk about something at length, often with a sense of preoccupation.

Dwindlement: A reduction in size, number, or intensity; the process of dwindling.

Example: "The dwindlement of the company's profits led to cost-cutting measures."

Dynamic: Pertaining to motion, energy, or change; characterized by continuous activity and progress.

Example: "The dynamic performance of the orchestra captivated the audience."

Dye: A substance used to change the color of something, often fabric or hair.

Example: "She decided to dye her hair a vibrant shade of red."

Dynamo: A machine that generates electricity, often through the rotation of a coil within a magnetic field.

Dyspepsia: A medical term for indigestion or discomfort in the upper abdomen, often accompanied by bloating or heartburn.

Dystocia: A medical term for difficult or abnormal childbirth, often requiring medical intervention.

Dyad: A pair of individuals or elements; a group or set of two.

Dyeing: The process of applying dye to change the color of something, such as fabric or hair.

Dysentery: A gastrointestinal illness characterized by inflammation of the intestines, leading to diarrhea with blood and mucus.
