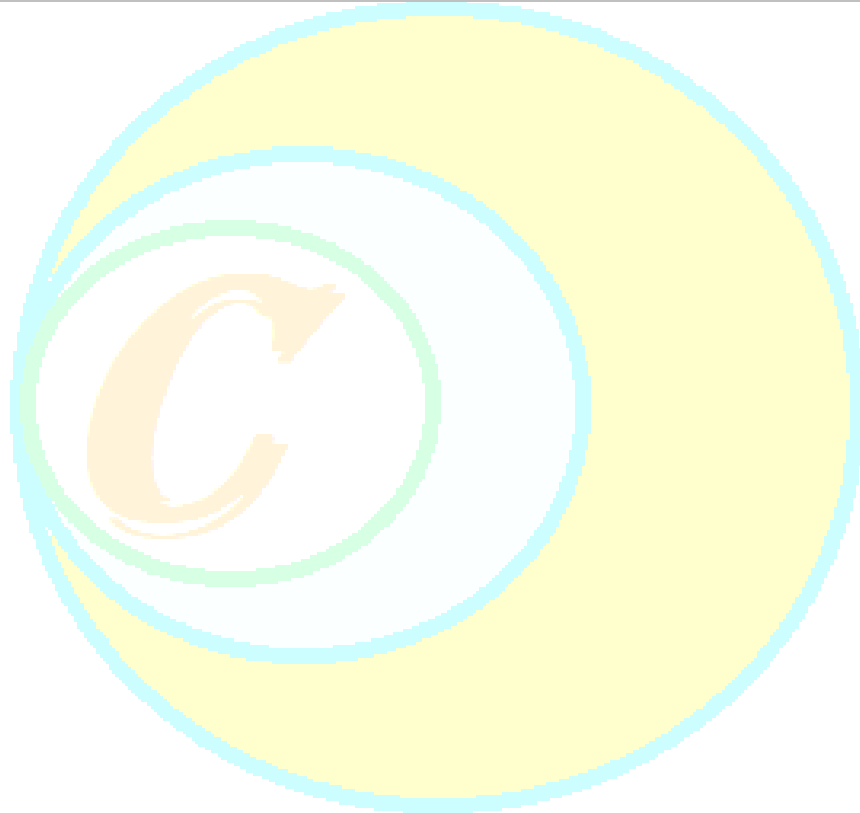


The Implementation of Directive Principles of State Policy (DPSP)
